NOVEMBER PROGRAM RECAP

Our branch showed up in force at LBCC on November 23 to help pack 155 Thanksgiving food boxes for LBCC families—both students and staff—in need. This translates into more than 600 people who were able to have a holiday meal last week. Thank you so much to our ten members who helped pack boxes: it was my first year volunteering, and it was a lot of fun!

For more than 25 years, LBCC's Chapter of American Association of Women in Community Colleges and the LBCC Independent Association of Classified Employees have co-sponsored the annual Thanksgiving Food Drive. This year, more than \$7200 was raised to purchase 30 WinCo carts of food, earning 42 free turkeys. LBCC's recently-axed Horticulture Department donated copious amounts of butternut squash and recipes for getting the best and most out of these prolific veggies.

Lena Spencer, of LBCC's Information Services Department, organized a challenge among departments in the Calapooia Center, which brought in over \$1300! To motivate teams and make it fun, the IS team provided baked goods to the department with the highest donations. The Student Leadership Council supported the food drive with a generous donation of \$1600. LBCC's Health Occupations Center, Lebanon Center and Sweet Home Center donated 1,862 items of food and cash.

This panel discussion will take place on Saturday, February 8, 1:00-2:30 p.m., in the meeting room at Albany Public Library on 14th Street. It is open to the public. We hope our members will publicize this to members of other groups that they attend, and we will have an article in the Albany paper in mid-January. This panel will help us understand a group of women whom most of us rarely think about.
