We hope that you had a great summer and that you are looking forward to a new AAUW year with new challenges and changes.


One of the big changes is how we generate branch funds this year. You should have received a letter in the mail by now explaining the new process.

I also wish to thank Lyn McGuire who performed our audit of the finances for this last year. For your peace of mind, she noted that (1) all receipts were deposited in a timely manner, (2) all signed checks had supporting documents, and (3) account reconciliations balanced with no outstanding checks cashed after 6 months. In addition, she noted that (4) the checking account balanced to the bank statements, (5) the debit card was used only for dues payments, and (6) Form 990-N was submitted to National on April 27, 2019.

The budget will be presented at the September 26th meeting. It was approved by the Board.

I only had 20 years in my career as a Software Developer, Systems Analyst, and Site Manager, as I contracted Lyme Disease in 1990. I got rid of it in 2000, but was never able to regain enough of my mental abilities, particularly speed and working memory, to resume a full-fledged career. Nowdays, I don't do any programming - I just use programs that other people have written.

From 1991- 2009 I had a horse ranch in Bozeman, Montana. I bred, raised, and trained large ponies for riding and driving, and horses for riding. I still love horses, but that itch has been scratched, and I never need to own another one; they tend to self-destruct, given the least chance. I particularly don't need to deal with another stallion. They are very opinionated. The mares insist on telling them how wonderful they are.

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My hobbies are learning Spanish and traveling to Spanish-speaking countries, and playing banjo and singing along with my one octave range. I love walking with my dog, and playing in my garden, joints permitting.

If We Had Known by Elaine Juska (314p) One afternoon, as single mother Maggie Daley prepares to send her only child off to college, their world is shattered by news of a mass shooting at the local mall in rural Maine. Maggie, an English professor, is further stunned to learn that the gunman had been a student of hers. Nathan Dugan was an awkward, complicated young man whose quiet presence in her classroom had faded from her memory-but not, it seems, the memories of his classmates. When a viral blog post hints at the existence of a dark, violence-tinged essay Nathan had written during Maggie's freshman comp seminar, Maggie soon finds herself at the center of a heated national controversy. Could the overlooked essay have offered critical red flags that might have warned of, or even prevented, the murders to come? As the media storm grows around her, Maggie makes a series of choices that threaten to destroy the life she's worked so hard to build, but-more important-the happiness and safety of her sensitive daughter, Anna.
