2020 is here and it already a busy one.


We are looking forward to having Georgia Applegate, President of AAUW and Elena Rae, Central District Chair visit us at our March 7th Program/Business Meeting.

Linn County Women’s Rally Celebrating the 19th Amendment on Saturday, Jan. 11.

It was entitled, “Votes for Women: A Portrait of Persistence,” and featured a variety of presentations—from musical entertainment, to slideshow, to sing-a-long tunes of suffragette songs, to three excellent speakers, and a skit that featured Theresa Johnson as Abigail Scott Duniway and Edie Orner as the Albany mayor’s wife. All was rounded out with a parade around the county courthouse block.

I would estimate 200 attendees, old, young and in between. Sponsors were Albany AAUW, The Linn Co. Women’s Rally, League of Women Voters of Linn County, and Albany First Christian Church.

Kids, especially girls and young women, are being helped by the donations that YOU made during our Branch Fundraising Effort during September and October 2019!

At the January 14, 2020, Branch Board meeting, after considerable discussion, Board members voted unanimously to give \$1,000. to the Maker's Club at the Albany Library; to give \$1,200. for scholarships to women at LBCC; and to give \$350. to the SWARM Robotics Team. Our Branch has supported all three of these groups in the past, and we are grateful to our members for their contributions to continue our support.

We need to note that we gave \$250. earlier this year in September to the Maker's Club for specific needs that April Spisak requested for the coming year's programs. Also, it was the consensus of the Board that a further donation to SWARM could be made after we have a clearer picture of the Branch's budget in March. 



NEWS: FEBRUARY 17, 2020

Today, the Oregon House of Representatives unanimously passed House Concurrent Resolution 204, commemorating the centennial of Oregon’s ratification of the 19th Amendment, which extended voting rights to most women in the United States. Oregon extended suffrage to women in 1912, eight years ahead of the national passage of the 19th amendment.

On Saturday, February 8, 2020, our Branch sponsored a panel discussion on the past, present, and future of women in OR prisons. Over 40 people were in the audience at the Albany Library as Julia Yoshimoto from the Women's Justice Center in Portland, Rosa Howard-Mumford from Oak Creek Youth Correctional Facility in Albany, and Jessica Kampfe from Shelly's House in Salem discussed the history and the future of their project/facility. A Q&A session followed with panelists answering written questions from the audience. This event was organized by members of our Branch's Great Discussion group, and member Gladys Hardin was the moderator for the panel. Thank you to this group for the effort it took to organize and publicize this panel and to Delta Kappa Gamma (women educators' honorary) for contributing cookies and coffee. Those attending left with a greater understanding of the complex legal issues, the need for more funding for facilities, the opportunities that exist to help women in Oregon's prisons, and appreciation for the intelligence and commitment of these three women panelists working to help women in prison.

Educated: a Memoir by Tana Westover (334p) Tara Westover was seventeen the first time she set foot in a classroom. Born to survivalists in the mountains of Idaho, she prepared for the end of the world by stockpiling home-canned peaches and sleeping with her "head-for-the-hills bag." In the summer she stewed herbs for her mother, a midwife and healer, and in the winter she salvaged in her father's junkyard. The family was so isolated from mainstream society that there was no one to ensure the children received an education, and no one to intervene when one of Tara's older brothers became violent. As a way out, Tara began to educate herself, learning enough mathematics and grammar to be admitted to Brigham Young University. Her quest for knowledge would transform her taking her to Harvard and to Cambridge. Only then would she wonder if she'd traveled too far, if there was still a way home.

My Dear Hamilton A Novel of Eliza Schuyler Hamilton by Stephanie Dray (641p) Dray and Kamoie used thousands of letters and original sources to tell Eliza's story as the wronged wife at the center of a political sex scandal and also as a founding mother who shaped an American legacy in her own right. She meets Alexander Hamilton, Washington's penniless but passionate aide-de-camp, they fall in love, despite Hamilton's bastard birth and the uncertainties of war. From inaugural balls to bloody street riots, the Hamiltons are at the center of the political treachery of America's first sex scandal, which forces Eliza to struggle through heartbreak and betrayal to find forgiveness. When a duel destroys Eliza's hard-won peace, the grieving widow fights her husband's enemies to preserve Alexander's legacy. But long-buried secrets threaten everything Eliza believes about her marriage and her own legacy, she's left with one last battle--to understand the flawed man she married and imperfect union he could never have created without her..

STEM UPDATE

January 22nd STEM Committee members Carol Wood, Karlene McDowell, and Rita Powell met our Makers Club leader April Spizak for a 2019-2020 Makers Club update. Overall, 58% of the participants are girls while the tween program boasts 70% girls which are quite encouraging numbers. An all ages hands on tinkering day drew 93 participants with 62 of them girls. The LBCC Pipeline is also involved providing programs including a wearable tech presentation with 3 more in the works during the school year. Upcoming programs include explosives in February, a STEM scavenger hunt in March, LBCC in April, and SWARM demonstration in May.

April mentioned the loss of Library staff and hours due to budget cuts. This was the perfect opening to present April with our AAUW donation to the Makers' Club of \$1000. She was quite overwhelmed and the donation will provide for many Makers Club future activities. Many thanks to all Albany AAUW members who provided the funds for this!

One last note, the new Library director will start February 8th. We asked April if she could plan a "meet and greet" for the new director to meet our AAUW group so that is in the works.
