Facebook has kept us in touch with people we may have visited, email the same, Zoom has replaced in-person group meetings, online ordering, and curbside pickup have helped us keep our homes stocked.


But for me, technology has given me the gift of a pastime that I had thought was lost. When I moved to Oregon, I had to leave my volunteer position with a historical society. I reconnected with them by email early in the pandemic and lamented the many free hours I had. They creatively found a way for me to engage with them even at a distance. They have a collection of photos from the 1950s donated by a news photographer. The photos are completely unlabeled and mostly only vaguely dated. They can send me the images through email. The local newspaper is available online. My job is to try to locate the photo in the newspaper and thus identify the people, place, and event. So for me, it is like a treasure hunt. I have to scan through old newspapers page by page trying to locate these images. I can't help myself from pausing and reading the headlines and stories from back then. And I love to inspect the old photos for items that are no longer in everyday use. When I successfully locate one in the paper and can make an identification, I think the whole neighborhood can hear my screams of delight!

#### Karlene McDowell, Secretary:

One challenge stands out among several this pandemic has brought to me: learning to drive an all-electric car. Sensitive and intelligent, she has survived for years alone in the marsh that she calls home, finding friends in the gulls and lessons in the sand. Then the time comes when she yearns to be touched and loved. When two young men from town become intrigued by her wild beauty, Kya opens herself to a new life--until the unthinkable happens.
